HERE AND THERE

North American Youth Chess Championships (October 5-7)



The last games of this tournament finished yesterday, resulting in a gold medal for Canada! Alexandra Botez of Port Moody led from start to finish and won the Girls' U12 Section with an undefeated 6.0/7 score. This victory qualifies her for the 2008 Pan-American Championship and according to the official website she also receives the title of Woman Candidate Master (FIDE stipulates that title events cannot have more than two rounds a day yet the tournament had three on Saturday, so I'm not quite sure how that works). There were several other strong Canadian performances which just missed winning a medal:

Jonah Lee (U8) lost in the third and fourth rounds but won his remaining games to score 5.0/7 - this tied him for second, but after tiebreaks he placed fourth. Jacob Jensen (U10) played on board one in the last round, but a rook versus knight and two pawns material imbalance gradually got away from him for a heartbreaking loss, leaving him tied for third with 5.0/7 but outside the medals on tiebreak. The other B.C. players on the team were Tanraj Sohal and Stefan Trandafir; in fact, all the Canadian players were from B.C. with the sole exception of Justin McDonald of Ontario, who was there with his father, CFC

Junior Coordinator Patrick McDonald. Another familiar name was American Robert Lau, who some might remember from the 2004 Western Canadian Open; he won the U16 Section with a perfect score. Congratulations especially to Alexandra, but also to all our Canadian representatives.

The tournament was held in Aguascalientes in Central Mexico, roughly the same longitude as Estevan, Saskatchewan. One hundred and eighty-two players took part, six from Canada, eleven from the United States, the rest from Mexico. This was only the second time the tournament has been held, the first was in Boca Raton, Florida in 2004. The official website has games, results, bulletins, photos, and videos, but has not been kept completely up-to-date: although all the prizewinners are listed, final standings from some of the sections are still not available. The photos are from the opening ceremonies and include several with Canadian content; the bulletins contain round summaries, pairings and results, photos, games, and several short interviews, with among others Andre Botez and Patrick and Justin McDonald. All of the available B.C. games are on the juniorchess website.

B.C. Senior Games Report (September 13) by Jonathan Berry

Brian Foan of Nanaimo won the tournament section of the B.C. Senior Games, September 13th in Nanaimo. Silver medalist was Dennis Snow, of Powell River. The B.C. Senior Games is an annual event for persons aged 55 and up. Chess has been played in the Games, but long ago, judging from memories and from the wording of the rules inherited from that time. Chess is an "optional" sport. If it's not specially requested, they don't have to put it in.

For the Senior Games, B.C. is divided into 12 Zones. Each Zone must hold a qualifying event, or else nobody from that zone may take part in the provincial finals. As it turned out, only Zone 2 (Northern Vancouver Island - Sunshine Coast) held a qualifier (organized by Wanda Mahony in Parksville). With two qualifying players from each Zone, and two competitions: tournament (rated 1500 or up) and Social

(rated below 1500 or unrated), that made the finals simple for the TD: two players in each competition, playing a short match.

In the Social section, Frank Kimantas of Nanaimo scored a steady 2-0 victory over Bill Wilson of Qualicum.

In the tournament section, also played at a time limit of one hour for the game, the competitors were Brian Foan (rated 1820 on the January 1974 CFC list) and Dennis Snow (1757 on TDLIST of 1997).

The two match games were filled with ideas.

It was the case throughout the match that both players thought bishops on "Bishop Four" to be strong, and often worthy of being traded off. 4...Bxd3 5.Qxd3 e6 6.Nf3 Nd7 7.0-0 h6 8.Qb3?! Leads to nothing. 8...Qb6 9.Qxb6?! axb6 10.Be3 c5? Black might still get a good game, but only in spite of, rather than because of, this move. The normal attack at White's pawn chain fails because of the weakness of b5 and because Black lags in development. 10...b5 is a slow way to shut down the queenside while figuring out a way to develop the pieces. A knight at f5 might be bolted in place by h6-h5. Ng8-e7-c8-b6 is also conceivable. The bishop looks natural at e7 and then Black could think about doubling rooks on the a-file. 10...f6 leads to a completely different type of game, but also in Black's favour. 11.c3 Ne7 12.Na3! Nf5 12...Ra5 prevents Nb5 and leads to a fairly even game. 13.Nb5 Kd8 13...Ra5 14.a4 c4. 14.Rfe1 Nxe3 Opens two ways for White to attack. A better try was 14...Be7. 15.Rxe3 Even better was 15.fxe3 intending e3-e4. 15...Ra5 16.a4 c4 17.h3 Nb8 18.Nd2! Nc6?! After 18...Be7 Black can defend the kingside pawns without tying himself up. 19.Rf3 Ke8? It might look like I'm being hard on Black because he only gets a bad position after this move, but how good is your position if the only practical chance to survive lies in 19...Ke7 20.b3 cxb3 21.Nxb3 Ra8 22.Nd2 f6 (22...Na5 23.Rb1 f6 24.exf6+ gxf6 25.Re1 Rc8 26.Rfe3 Rc6 27.Na7+-) 23.exf6+ gxf6 24.Re3 Kd7 (24...e5 25.Nc7 Rd8 26.dxe5 fxe5 27.c4 d4 28.Rb3+/-) 25.Rxe6+/=

Nice. White's pieces are well developed on their original squares, unlike Black's. White sets up a gravy train on c3-b5. **22...Ke7**



Both players like the "bad bishops outside the pawn chain" model of chess. I'd be inclined to continue c4 with a quick Qb3 in mind. **4.e3 e6 5.Bd3 Ne7 6.Nc3 a6 7.Nh4 Bxd3 8.Qxd3 Nd7** Luckily, on 8...g5 White has 9.Be5, though after 9...Rg8 10.Nf3 Nd7 11.Bg3 Nf5 Black would have redressed the episcopal deficit. **9.Nf3 g5 10.Be5 f6 11.Bg3 h5 12.h3 Rh6 13.e4** In response to an attack on the wing, counter in the centre. **13...Nb6 14.b3**

14.e5 isn't quite the shot that it might appear at first, because after 14...Nf5 15.exf6 Nxg3 16.f7+ Kxf7 17.Ne5+ Kg8 Black is safe. 14.0-0 and 14.0-0-0 are both reasonable options. 14...Ng6 15.e5 f5 16.Ne2 Bb4+ 16...h4. 17.c3 Be7 18.Nd2 Qd7 19.f4?! 0-0-0 19...h4 20.fxg5 Bxg5 21.Bf2 0-0-0=/+ 20.Nf3 g4! 20...gxf4 21.Bxf4 Nxf4 22.Nxf4 Rg8 -/+ according to Fritz4, but I'm not convinced. 21.hxg4 fxg4 22.Ng5?! 22.Nh4 is about even. A piquant moment. After 30...Rh8! White would either take a draw (which would lose him the match, but in Dennis's mind would require another game), or play 31.g3 with only a slight advantage. **31.Ng3! Rf8 32.Rdf1? Qb5 33.f5?!** 33.Nxe6 Kxe6 34.f5+ Kd7 35.Bxh6+-.



Here Black had five minutes left, and I prepared to advise him, after he moved, that he would not have to record any more moves. However, after thinking for about 4 minutes and 45 seconds, he said something like "I guess I'm going to lose on time" and the players soon shook hands. This is a supremely impractical way to play the game. It seemed to me that Black must try 33...hxg3 and now the computer finds White's way to victory: (33...Nc4) 34.Nxe6! (34.Rxh6 Qxf1+-+; 34.fxe6+ Kc6-/+) 34...Rxh1 35.Nxf8+ Nxf8 36.Rxh1+-. Even this takes a bit of self-convincing, whereas White's obvious tries (in the parentheses) quickly lead to debacle. **1-0**

So with the score tied 1-1, we went to tiebreaks. The brace of 15-minute games showed Brian Foan to be a quick and confident player. Although Dennis Snow wasn't exactly slow, his opponent was minutes up on the clock in both games with a reasonable position. Brian won the playoff 2-0 and the gold medal. A tie would have resulted in another two-game match. After that, we would have gone to 6-5

Armageddon.

Next year's games are in Prince George. If you are born 1953 or earlier, you are eligible--but only if there is a zonal tournament where you live! CFC and BCCF membership are not required, and the games are not rated. There was a fair bit of local interest from players wishing to compete. It is a mid ground between tournament chess and skittles. It is a form of serious competition for social players.

WEBSITE UPDATES

Thanks to webmaster Glen Lee the BCCF website has been updated in a number of areas. Additions have been made to the lists of champions, including a list of B.C. women champions (any omissions or errors, please contact swright2@telus.net). The Bulletin page now includes an index of major items in each issue; these are mainly historical, since specific tournaments can be accessed via the given Bulletin dates of publication. The indexing is currently from issue #51 forward, the remaining issues will be indexed shortly. And last but not least, the BCBASE games database has been updated. It now contains over 15,000 games with B.C. content (either played here or by B.C. players elsewhere), and is current up to and including the Langley Labour Day tournament.
