#### 2008 CANADIAN CHESS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

The Canadian Chess Hall of Fame is another initiative of David Cohen, who writes:

"As you know, I've been alternating living with past (deceased) contributors to Canadian chess. When I started this effort in 2000, I viewed it as a recognition of our best achievements, such as the Grandmaster title, combined with the opportunity to publicize these achievements. But after my initial selections of 25 people in 2000 and 2001, I kept it to one per year. I've come to view the selection as more of a 'Lifetime Achievement' award - for people who've never had this recognition of their contributions to Canadian chess. In looking at our Canadian chess community, it really struck me that we've neglected our best people over the years. In 2006, I chose Zoltan Sarosy. As you know, that was the year he turned 100. When I heard of his age, I realized I needed to give some priority to giving this award to our people while they are still alive!

Continuing in this vein, I've decided to select 93 year-old Cyril Large of Nanaimo, BC for 2008. My impression was that Cyril was someone who just went out and did it. He organized annual school chess tournaments on Vancouver Island which grew to be the largest in the country by far. He also successfully obtained sponsorship from good companies, like a local fruit juice producer. These were two efforts that were years ahead of their time. I'd like to think that his efforts resulted in some sustained good for chess in Canada. E-mail conversations with Lynn Stringer have confirmed this. I'd also appreciate hearing more from anyone else."

## Cyril Large

- Organized chess on Vancouver Island, British Columbia in 1960s and 1970s
- Organized annual school chess tournaments, which grew to involve 6,625 players from 162 schools by 1976
- At age 90 in 2004, still plays one game of chess every evening with his wife, aged 95

A fuller biography was given by Jonathan Berry in the November-December 1975 CFC Bulletin:

"Cyril Large, of Victoria, BC, is the director of Canada's largest chess tournament, and has been every year for the past five. You don't believe it? Well, let's start at the beginning. Cyril Large was born in Tiny, Saskatchewan - aptly named because it consisted of one grain elevator and five houses. It was there that Cyril Large learned chess at his father's knee. The love of chess stayed with him through his career as an orderly. It was then that he thought of organizing chess among elementary school children. His first attempt was in 1969. He organized Chess Partners - adults willing to help supervising and transporting elementary school children to play chess. The first attempt was a relative failure. Undaunted, Cyril Large decided he needed some publicity and funding. His first sponsor was C-FAX radio station. You may think it was easy to organize a tournament with a radio station on your side. It helps, but you still have to contact people personally. In 1971, Cyril Large set up door-to-door canvassing in the Blanchard area of Victoria. The first C-FAX Chess Tournament in 1971 had a mere 1,649 entrants. In the same year, Cyril Large had an accident at work. He went on sick leave - never to return. Under his able management, the C-FAX tournament grew:

1972 2,476 players from 67 schools 1973 2,965 players from 74 schools 1974 3,536 players from 76 schools 1975 5,073 players from 103 schools [1976 6,625 players from 162 schools]

Along the way, two other sponsors offered to help out with the growing project. Today the Canada Safeway \* Sprite \* C-FAX Chess Tournament covers elementary schools all over southern Vancouver Island, and is the biggest event of its kind in North America (and, we suspect, biggest in the western world). Chess is news in Victoria. On January 11, 1975, the *Victoria Times* ran a five-column photo of the grade 3 championships on the front page. Why not in your city?"

[1976 was the last year of the C-FAX tournaments, Mr. Large became too ill to continue organizing them - ed.]

## **B.C. PLAYERS AT HASTINGS**

One of the longest chess traditions in the world is the annual Hastings congress which, with the exception of the war years, has been going on in one form or another since 1920. Both of B.C.'s OTB grandmasters played at Hastings, Suttles in 1973/74 and Biyiasas in 1978/79 and 1979/80 (Biyiasas also played in the Challengers' tournament in 1977/78). Respective winners of these events were Szabo, Tal, Timman, and Kuzmin in 1973/74, and Ulf Andersson for the latter two tournaments.
