HERE AND THERE

Olympiad (November 12-25)

The biennial Chess Olympiad is currently in full swing in Dresden, Germany. Canada has sent five member Open and Women's teams which include Pascal Charbonneau, a former B.C. resident; Hikaru Nakamura and Valeriya Gansvind are also playing, for the U.S. and Estonia respectively.

Internet coverage is extensive. All the games are broadcast live (beginning 6 a.m. our time) using DGT boards; on the official site, click on the large "live" button, then click on the team of interest. On the latter screen player names are clickable, also it is possible to view all four games of a match simultaneously using the "games" button on the same line as the country names (the positions in this option are rather small, though.) There have apparently been problems with the PGN files available via the official site, and most are recommending obtaining the game files via The Week In Chess (TWIC). Chessbase has their usual large pictorial reports, and a Canadian perspective is available from Chesstalk (game commentary by IM Tom O'Donnell and on site reports from arbiter Hal Bond) and the CFC discussion board (comments by GM Kevin Spraggett).

Vernon Junior Sean Kelman won the 26th edition of the Silver Star Classic, his first tournament championship, sweeping the field and drawing only the final round. Congratulations Sean. Wally Steinke and Stewart Paulson tied for second place with 3 / 4.

On a sad note, this Silver Star Challenge had the lowest number of participants since its inception in 1982. The new (for us) time control of g/90 with 30 sec. increments was well received, but downsizing to 4 rounds from the usual 5 was not. (Next year we will revert to a 5 rounder.) Nevertheless, the tournament was very enjoyable for all six (!) players. Participation of only two visitors, one from Kelowna and one from Langley is just not enough support to warrant continuing events like this. Over the board tournaments need more support or they will surely disappear, leaving nothing but the unsatisfying sterility of internet play, and extinguishing from our beloved game, the enjoyment and social satisfaction that can only be found in friendly face-to-face competition.

B.C. JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

This year's event, held at what has become the standard location of B.C. junior tournaments in the Lower Mainland, Sprott Shaw Community College in New Westminster, attracted a total of fifty-four players in three sections. The Championship was somewhat weaker than it has been in recent years: there were no masters or experts in the field. Instead, a bevy of young, ambitious A-players fought for top honours, with no obvious favourite at the beginning of play. As the tournament progressed Tanraj Sohal emerged as the leader, while his rivals fell by the wayside. In the first round Jack Cheng overlooked a lateral check and was mated by Henry Ji, who

continued his winning ways in round two by defeating Richard Huang; Alexandra Botez lost to John Doknjas, while Tanraj surged forward by defeating Doknjas and the Han twins, Yiming and Yifei. Going into the last round Tanraj had a perfect 4.0/4, a full point ahead of his closest rivals, Jack Cheng and Alexandra Botez. After tense draws on the top boards the final positions remained the same - Jack and Alexandra tied for second/third on 3.5, a point behind new Junior Champion Tanraj Sohal. Although there were few "older" players present, the junior is theoretically a U20 event; what makes Tanraj's victory all the more strking is that he only celebrated his twelfth birthday in October. More research would be necessary to make a definitive statement, but it seems likely that Tanraj is the youngest B.C. Junior Champion ever, beating the previous holder of that honour, Andrew Ho, by some four and a half months. The U1700 prize was shared by Henry Ji and Ryan Lo.

Tanraj was "warmed up" for the junior by playing in the WYCC in the previous weeks; another player who took full advantage of his WYCC experience was Jonah Lee, who swept the Reserve Section with a perfect score. Jeremy Hui placed second with 4.0/5, a half point ahead of third place Anderson Yee. The trio of Marko Mitrovic, Jill Ding, and lain Ang tied for the U1200 prize. Edwin Xu and Humphrey Shao tied for first in the Booster Section, a half point ahead of Michael Gao and Sumin Moon. Congratulations to all the winners, and thanks to Ken Jensen, Andrei Botez, and all the other volunteers who made the tournament happen.

BCCF MEMBERSHIP RESTRUCTURING

[N.B. the following only applies to the BCCF portion of the membership fee, currently \$12 for an adult. The CFC portion, \$36 for an adult player, remains unchanged - ed.]

The BCCF has decided to change its membership structure. As of Jan. 1, 2009, the BCCF will no longer charge an annual membership. In its place, the BCCF will charge a per player, per event fee for BCCF sanctioned events.

This fee will be \$2 per player for 1 day events, \$4 per player for multiple day events, and \$0 for exclusively junior events. For CFC rated events, the fees will be submitted to

the CFC by the tournament organizer / TD, which will in turn submit them to the BCCF. To the extent that the CFC remits a portion of CFC tournament membership fees to the BCCF, organizers will be credited with that amount against the required per player BCCF fees. At time of writing, the CFC has a motion in place that starting Jan. 1 no amount of tournament membership fees will go to the BCCF although we understand that that motion may be rescinded or altered.

Members of the BCCF will be those who, in the preceding 12 months, have played in, directed, or TD'd an event for which the fees have been paid. BCCF life memberships will be no longer sold. Existing BCCF life memberships will be honored by being exempt from the above fees. A list of BCCF members is posted on the BCCF website.

Existing annual BCCF memberships will also be honored through exemption of the above fees for the transition period Jan.1 2009 to Jan. 1 2010.

The BCCF is undertaking these changes to a) lessen the fees charged for first time and occasional players, b) to account for CFC life members who are not presently paying

BCCF dues, c) to ensure that players using CFC tournament memberships contribute to the BCCF, and d) generally to ensure that those active in the BCCF community are BCCF members. The amount of the fees has been set to generate approximately the same amount of revenue that the BCCF raised previously from memberships. DAVID ("DAVE") CREEMER (5 October 1902 - 21 December 1953)



The current trophy for the B.C. Junior Championship is the Dave Creemer Trophy. After his death a Dave Creemer Memorial Fund was established "for the purpose of introducing and encouraging chess in the schools of Vancouver and throughout B.C., also in high schools and among other youth groups or organizations" (BCCF Special Meeting, 13 January 1954). Monies from the fund were used to supply chess sets to schools and trophies for school competitions; in 1967 a BCCF motion was passed which stated "that the Trustees of the Dave Creemer Fund be instructed to wind up the Fund and to make the money left in the fund available to the Junior Chess Co-ordinator, and that the Junior Chess Co-ordinator ensure that the name of Dave Creemer is suitably perpetuated in the field of Junior Chess." This was done by holding the 2003 junior championship and naming the current trophy in his memory, on the fiftieth anniversary of his passing.

Born in Bessarabia, Russia (now largely Moldova). Trained as a tailor, Creemer emigrated to Canada in 1920 and first lived in Toronto, working for Tip Top Tailors, etc. He married in 1927; shortly thereafter the couple moved to Winnipeg, where Creemer started his own tailoring business. In October 1941 the family moved to Vancouver, where Creemer's brother and sister already lived. He started the Fashion Garment Co., a made-to-measure ladies tailoring establishment whose clientele included visiting celebrities such as Martha Rae and Ella Fitzgerald. Tailoring seems to have been the family trade: Dave's brother Max was also in the profession, as president of the Reliable Garment Co. Dave Creemer died at age fifty-one of complications from an ulcerated stomach.

Creemer learnt to place chess in Russia; while in Toronto he was secretary of the Judean Chess Club, and played against Emanuel Lasker in a simul. He won the Manitoba championship in 1934 and the Winnipeg championship in 1937, and was an early coach for Abe Yanofsky. After moving to Vancouver Creemer won the Vancouver Chess Club championship in 1942 and was instrumental in the founding of the Vancouver Jewish Chess Club; he was Vancouver champion 1946-48, but his greatest achievement as a player was winning the Open tournament held to celebrate the Vancouver Diamond Jubilee in July 1946.

Although Creemer was a strong player, his lasting legacy lies in the realm of chess organization and promotion. He held various positions on the BCCF Executive, including president, secretary, and publicity manager, and was chairman of the organizing committee which brought the Canadian Championship to the West Coast for the first time in 1951. From the summer of 1947 until his death Creemer wrote a weekly chess column in the *Vancouver Province* newspaper: each saturday the column included a chess problem ladder, news from local, Canadian, and international events, and usually several games. This did much to publicize the BCCF and chess in general throughout B.C.
