HERE AND THERE

World Youth Chess Championships (November 11-23)



The WYCC wrapped up last weekend in Kemer-Antalya, Turkey. Twenty-one Canadians were among the 1,324 participants, including four players from B.C.: Dezheng Kong (U10), Jack Qian (U12), Alexandra Botez (U14G), and Karen Lam (U16G). They scored 6.5, 4.0, 6.5, and 3.5 points respectively in the eleven-round Swiss. The big Canadian news from the event was the result of Edmonton's Richard Wang, who amassed 8.5 points and tied for second in the U12 Section - he was awarded the bronze medal on tiebreaks. Congratulations to the entire team, and thanks to the various parents, coaches, and other individuals who contributed to this Canadian performance on the world stage. Standings, games, photos, and videos (including an interview with members of the Canadian team) are available from the official website; unfortunately the games are in individual PGN files by section and round. German trainer Reinhold Goldau produced a composite game file which is linked at the end of the Chessbase report. However, the round 5 games are missing (they had not yet been posted on the official site when Goldau made his file).

JACK TAYLOR MEMORIAL (November 21-22) by Roger Patterson

Twenty-three people attended the 24th annual Jack Taylor Memorial - a 15% increase over the last few years and near the record high attendece for this tournament of twenty-four. This was despite the tournament not being CFC rated. The tournament benefited from several Vancouver players desperately searching for some action plus a visitor from Washington and another from Germany.

Howard Wu won his second Jack Taylor Memorial in a row with four wins and a bye for 4.5 points, worth \$75. He managed to bypass the other likely contenders who all self destructed in one way or

another. Tied for top U1800 were Joe Roback from Vancouver, Jason Cao (who missed an eleventh hour draw against Valeria Gansvind), and Ken Forman, all with 3 points, worth \$17 each. Thanks to our TD Mark S. Dutton, IA and all those who participated.

As regards this tournament not being CFC rated: this tournament is intended to be a low cost entry point for new players (entry fee of \$25). The current CFC membership fee structure is not compatible with that goal, effectively doubling the cost of the entry fee for new players. Of the twenty-three players, only eleven were current CFC members, seven were expired members, and five have never been a CFC member. I know of two people who did not play because it was not CFC rated and I know of three or four who would not have played had it been CFC rated.

Taylor, John ("Jack") Monteith (July 11, 1907 - September 9, 1974)



Born in Glasgow, Scotland. The Taylor family immigrated to Canada when Jack was fourteen, arriving at Quebec aboard the S.S. Cassandra on July 1, 1922. They first lived in Regina, Saskatchewan, but settled permanently in Vancouver a few years later. After graduating from UBC Jack worked as a traffic manager, initially for the David Spencer Department Store (bought by Eatons in 1948), later for Forsts Ltd. Jack Taylor did not learn to play chess until he came to Vancouver, but progressed so rapidly that only five years later, in 1929, he won the B.C. Championship: "The victory of Mr. J.M. Taylor by 5-0 proclaims the appearance of a new star in the British Columbia chess firmament. The new champion is a British Columbia University man, twenty-one years of age, and is evidently modest and unassuming, for he asks for explanatory notes to the game and helpful information. His opening is scholarly with considerable combinative power in the middle game, is our verdict." [Thomas Piper, Daily Colonist, 14 April 1929]

"Mr. J.M. Taylor gave us the pleasure of his company for a few days. The new champion is well versed in the learning of chess, plays over the classical examples from memory, and has a sound position judgment with combinative powers of a high order. He is a most pleasant opponent, courteous and unassuming in manner, and is a valuable acquisition to British Columbia in general and Vancouver in particular." [Thomas Piper, *Daily Colonist*, 4 August 1929] Taylor repeated as B.C. Champion in 1930, 1938, and 1945, and tied for first in 1953; he was also Vancouver Champion on numerous occasions. Jack never made much of a mark nationally, always finishing in the lower half of the Canadian Championships he played in (Saskatoon 1945, Vancouver 1951, Winnipeg 1953, Vancouver 1957). However, he did win a number of miniatures in these competitions due to his sharp eye for tactics; he won games in 12 and 10 moves respectively in the 1945 and 1953 competitions. Jack was a very popular player, and was instrumental in the development of the City Chess Club when it was formed as an offshoot of the Vancouver Chess Club in 1948.

"We note with regret the passing of Jack Taylor. Jack loved chess and played a very good game. In 1929, Jack won the B.C. Championship. In his last tournament, Jack came second in the 'A' Section of the B.C. Class Championships in April. However Jack will be remembered most for his candour and cheerfulness; whenever you wanted to see somebody enjoying himself, all you had to do was go and watch Jack Taylor, the man with the smile." [CFC Bulletin, January/February 1975]

B.C. JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

The last few years have seen substantial changes at the higher levels of B.C. junior chess. Fanhao Meng, Lucas Davies, Bindi Cheng, and Louie Jiang have all either 'graduated' or moved elsewhere, and a number of stronger players who still qualify have chosen not pursue the title of Junior Champion. The resultant power vacuum is slowly being filled by our younger members, most of whom are well below the U20 age requirement for the Junior; indeed, they would qualify for the old Cadet category (U16) with several years to spare. Last year Tanraj Sohal won the title while only twelve years of age; this year we have an even younger champion in Janak Awatramani, who is only ten. Going into the tournament the main contenders appeared to be a group of six players, consisting of two experts (Tanraj Sohal and Jack Cheng) and four "A" players (John Doknjas, Yifei and Yiming Han, and Jingzhou Lai). However, these six spent their time taking points off each other, while Janak quietly and steadily overtook them. He finished with 4.5/5, a full point ahead of second place finishers Tanraj Sohal, John Doknjas, and Yiming Han. Janak has won three first prizes in a row: the September Active II, a gold medal at the North American Youth Chess Championships, and now the B.C. Junior. There was a four-way tie for the U1700 prize between Jeremy Hui, Donovan Zhao, Ryan Lo, and Uma Bolatov, each with 2.5. The U1500 Reserve Section was won convincingly by Joanne Foote with 4.0/5, Anderson Yee and Lionel Han tied for second, and Joshua Doknjas took the U1100 prize. In the U1000 Booster Section there was a three-way tie for first between Marcus Andrews, Hasara Samayawardhena, and Owen Napieralski. A total of forty-four partcipated in the various sections, held at the New Westminster campus of Sprott-Shaw College. Many thanks to organizer Ken Jensen, Wolfram Herdin, and all the other personnel and volunteers who made the weekend a success.

Janak has a very specific game plan with either colour: fianchetto the light-squared bishop (is he right handed?), attempt to close the centre, delay castling until the opponent's king is committed, then attack. In this game Cheng blundered a piece on move 13, yet the game was decided by the clock. Jack is a slow player, and the game/90 sudden death time control was his undoing. He obtained chances with his kingside pawns, but simply had no time to work things out, particularly since Janak was blitzing him (a very risky policy if you already have a winning position).
