HERE AND THERE

September Active (September 18)

Mayo Fuentebella demonstrated the form that enabled him to tie for first in the B.C. Active Championship back in January - he won the September Active with a perfect score, a point clear of the field. Three players scored 4.0 points: James Chan was officially second, Ryan Lo claimed the U2000 prize with a last-round win over Butch Villavieja, while Dejan Radic (1624) lost his first game to Fuentebella and then won four straight to take the U1700 prize. The biggest upset prize went to Nathaniel Know (1208), who beat Alice Xiao (1822) in the first round. Thirty players participated in the event, held as usual at the Vancouver Bridge Centre and organized by Luc Poitras. Watch for the next active, coming up on October 2. Crosstable

VICTORIA OLYMPIAD FUNDRAISER (September 17)

Eighteen players took part in a one day Active Chess event at the Victoria Chess Club on Saturday, September 17th. The event was a fundraiser for Canada's participation in the 40th Chess Olympiad to take place in Istanbul, Turkey in 2012. Ray Wu was the surprise winner; ranked only tenth in the field, he started the tournament with a first round draw against top rated Howard Wu (no relation), then cruised to victory with wins against Mathew Geng, Li Geng, Roger Patterson, and Paul Leblanc. Second place was captured by World Under 10 Champion Jason Cao with a last round win over Mark Dutton. The U1700 trophy was won by Gulf Islands resident Deron Stewart, followed by Nick Peters.

Both Ray and Deron had their VCC ratings adjusted to reflect their outstanding performances. \$203 was raised for the Olympiad Team. Thanks to all those who donated and to all participants.

"TOUGH AS NAILS" - LEO DUVAL

A B.C. historical figure who has largely been forgotten is Leo Manners Duval (April 1, 1888 - February 20, 1976). One of B.C.'s strongest players in the 1940s, he won the B.C. Championship in 1941, 1942, 1943, and 1946, and on the CFC rating list in 1957 he was second in B.C., considerably behind Miervaldis Jursevskis but just ahead of Gerry Neufahrt - this at the age of sixty-nine! More research is needed, as many details of his life remain unknown, but Duval was born in Lake Megantic, Quebec, served in the First World War (where he rose to the rank of lieutenant and won the Military Cross), and worked as a civil engineer. I do not know when he moved to Vancouver, but he took part in a match against Seattle in 1938. Paul Brown remembers playing Duval: "Nigel Fullbrook and I were members of the Kerrisdale Chess Club in the late 60's and 70's. I recall him telling me one evening on the way home that he played this very old player that evening and found him to be quite formidable. He told me that this guy was tough as nails. I played the elderly gentleman the following week and asked Mr. E. C. Boire, the club organizer, what the gentleman's name was. He told me that it was "Mr. Duval." I estimate that he was in his late 80's or early 90's at the time. Although Nigel and I played him several times after that, I don't recall if I was ever lucky enough to beat him."

Apart from his provincial championship wins, perhaps Duval's most prominent result was his showing in the 1945 Canadian Championship. This was only the second time that B.C. had representation at a Canadian championship (the first was John Ewing at Hamilton, 1924); Jack Taylor finished 9th, but Duval was alone in 5th place, and only lost one game - to Taylor!

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The tournament was largely a battle between the top four finishers, who all scored 8.5/9 against the rest of the field - but the player they all drew against was Duval. These were not grandmaster draws either, as the games below will attest; it should also be remembered that Duval was fifty-seven years old at the time.

Those with a B.C. connection: Roy (CFC president) and MacAdam both moved here in later life, Taylor and Duval were provincial champions, Divinsky and Helman played as Manitoba representatives in this event, but both moved to Vancouver. Helman was B.C. champion in 1947 and 1948 before dying suddenly in 1952, Divinsky is alive and well and living at UBC.
