Piasetski in Europe

Continuing on the Spanish summer tournament circuit in the Barcelona area, Leon competed in group A of the 16th Sant Marti Open (July 13-21), scoring 50% without playing the last two rounds. The overall winner was Armenian GM Karen Grigoryan with 7.5/9. Immediately following this was the 40th Sitges Open (July 22-31), still underway as we go to press, in which currently has 3.0/6.

The annual Canadian Youth Chess Championships (see report below) are not only a qualifier to the World Youth, but also to various continental events. In Canada's case this means the North American YCC, this year held in Tarrytown, New York (see the report in Bulletin #282), and the Panamerican Youth Festival, recently finished in Oaxtepec, Mexico. Due to the vagaries of scheduling the Panamerican often occurs at the same time as the CYCC, despite the fact the latter is supposed to be a qualifier for the former. This was also the case this year (the FIDE website still show the Panamerican as taking place during the week of July 17-24, whereas it was moved to the week before) and consequently our youth cannot take part, or if they do they miss the CYCC. Three Canadians decided to participate this year, including Tanraj Sohal from this province in the U18 "Absoluto." The competition resulted in a four-way tie for first on 7.0/9; had Tanraj won his last game he would have been part of this group, but instead lost and tied for seventh. He was more fortunate in the U18 blitz, coming clear first with <a href="footnoted-state-sta

Sixteen players from B.C. recently completed a two-stage online correspondence tournament that took approximately ten months to finish. After 132 games were decided, Valer Eugen Demian and Savvas Kyriakides ended up tied for first place overall, scoring 7.0/8 in the final. The goal of this tournament was to bring together a wide range of Chess players from the local region and to use the correspondence format to improve opening knowledge and general play. The tournament consisted of sixteen players which is encouraging for a first-time event. The 2014 tournament is already accepting registrations, and we welcome all interested players to sign up soon. 2014 CANADIAN/QUEBEC OPEN (July 19-26)

The first ever Canadian Open was held back in 1956 in Montreal and attracted just eighty-eight players; the next time the Canadian Open was in Montreal was 1974 during the Fischer boom, and the 636 participants set a record for the event which has been in no danger of being broken since. Fast forward to the new millennium; Montreal has held the Canadian Open in conjunction with the Quebec Open every six years since 2002, including this year. In 2002 and 2008 the turnout was 325/6, but this year there were just over four hundred entrants, making it the biggest Canadian Open since 1976 (with the caveat that the exact number is difficult to determine from the results, see below). Held at the Fairmont Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal, the event adopted the same sectional format as the Quebec Open: 2400+ (A), U2400 (B), U2000 (C), U1700 (D), U1300 (E). There were some glitches early on; free entry was given to CYCC participants and roughly seventy-five players indicated they would take advantage of this, but many of them later did not join the Canadian Open, resulting in many forfeits. The Swiss Manager program was being used for pairings but the software had a meltdown for Sections B and C on the second day, resulting in manual pairings and considerable confusion. There was also a mini-COC of four games taking place over the first weekend, but it appears a number of its participants were not taken out of the system after that weekend was over. However, things returned to normal after a couple of days, and the only other issue was a delay in the announcement of the final prize distribution due to a large number of ties.

The A Section boasted eleven GMs and with a couple of exceptions they predictably finished at the top of the crosstable, led by the trio of Sergey Tiviakov, Robin van Kampen (both Netherlands), and Ehsan Ghaem Maghami (Iran) on 6.5/9, with Tiviakov taking the overall title after Armageddon games. Top Canadian was Anton Kovalyov a half point back. But the big news for this province was the IM norm obtained by Jason Cao of Victoria; he scored a win and two draws against the five GMs he faced, and his final result of five points meant his norm was achieved with a round to spare, fortunate given that he lost to Nick De Firmian in the last round. Jason also adds a healthy 44 points to his FIDE rating.



Monetarily the big B.C. winner was Luke Pulfer, who won the U1800 prize in Section C. Other prize winners from this province included Joshua Doknjas, part of a thirteen(!)-way tie for eighth place, U2200, U2100, cadet, and senior prizes in Section B; Ethan Low, James Rowan, and Annika Zhou, part of a four-way tie for the U1400 prize in Section D; and Doug Sly, who took home a quarter of the senior prize in the same section.

2014 CYCC (July 15-18)

Held at the same site and immediately before the Canadian Open, this year's CYCC set a new record for attendance, with 315 youth seeking national titles in eleven separate sections divided by gender and two-year age brackets (the U16 and U18 girls were combined). Some thirty-five players from B.C. participated, and five of them won trophies: Aiden Zhou (third, U8), Cindy Zhao (second, U10G), Joshua Doknjas (second, U12), Max Gedajlovic (second, U14), and Uranchimeg Nyamdorj (first, U16G). Mention should also be made of Lucian Wu (U8), who tied for third but lost out in the tiebreak procedure, Kevin Low and Rowan James, who both tied for fourth in the U10, and Callum Lehingrat and Kai Richardson, who both tied for fifth in the U12. Congratulations to the winners, and to all the players who represented B.C. so ably.

This FIDE-rated tournament was held at UBC from January 6-21, 1984. Five out of the fourteen players already have FIDE ratings. A score of 6.0/13 was needed to acquire a FIDE rating from this tournament. Congratulations to Paul Brown (8.0-5.0), Nigel Fullbrook (6.5-6.5), and Tyler Johnson (6.5-6.5) for acquiring a rating. The tournament was closely-contested from the beginning to the end. IM Leon acquired the lead on GM Duncan Suttles after the sixth round. Unfortunately Piasetski gave up a draw in the last round to allow Suttles to catch up and share first place with 11.0-2.0. En route, Suttles gave up four draws to the second-fifth ranked players! Piasetski, on the other hand, dropped a game to Alex Szabo (1966)! Ken Tomkins of Seattle tied with FM Bob Zuk for third with 9.0-4.0. Zuk could have scored higher had he not been forced to take a four-hour bus rides to the tournament site everyday. Tomkins started off the tournament by scoring 2.5-0.5 against Zuk, Fullbrook, and Brown! However, he gave up too many draws to only tie for third.

Alex Szabo achieved only 4.5 points in this tournament. However, two of these points were against 2300 players - Zuk and Piasetski. Tyler Johnson also played extremely well to gain 108 rating points. Incidentally, this was Suttles' second Canadian tournament since 1975. Another veteran was expert John Lee who played his second tournament since 1973! The lack of practice showed in both player's scores. Finally, many thanks to the FIDE-rated players without whom this

tournament would be impossible. Special thanks to Duncan Suttles who did not request an appearance fee. If he did, the tournament would have acquired a deficit.
