She is now taking part in Group B of the Moscow Open, and currently has 4.5/6 in the nine-round Swiss event, good enough to tie for 19th in the 300-odd player field. Vancouver January Open

Vancouver's first open tournament of the year took place at the Vancouver Bridge Centre on the weekend of January 26-28. Nine masters and experts took part in the twenty-three player Open Section; this included two experts playing in their first local event. Dan Erichsen and Kirk Gornall (both recently arrived from England, although Erichsen is originally from Denmark). The section also included a number of ambitious juniors who put their more experienced opponents to the test, but in the end the adults held the top places - with one exception. That exception was last year's Canadian Junior Champion Bindi Cheng, who gave up only one draw on his way to first place. Coming in clear second with 4/5 was newcomer Kirk Gornall, while Dan Scoones and Andrey Kostin were a further half point off the pace. The U2000 prizes were distributed three ways, between resurgent Philip Harris, rising junior player Chang He Li, and newcomer Joe Soliven; all scored three points. The twelve-player U1600 Section was predominately a junior affair and included a contingent from Seaguam School in Delta. Alex Sabaratnam and Foster Tom drew with each other and won the rest of their games to share first place, while Jimmy He, Jenny Hsueh, and Johnny Zhang tied for the U1100 prize. Stephen Wright was the TD, assisted by Katherine Davies.

This was the first tournament I have organized which included the option of using incremental time controls. Also the playing session was shortened, to four hours (game/90 with a 30 second increment, or game/120 sudden death). As a player who liked endgames I always preferred as much thinking time as I could get, but the 90+30 time control has been a FIDE standard for some time now. Despite this I still think four hours is too short for "serious" competitions, but for a weekend tournament involving non-professional players I felt it appropriate to give people a little more free time away from the chess board. There were a few games in which the time control produced results other than those expected, but in general it seems the players didn't mind or adapted to the shortened playing session. This will remain an ongoing issue, so if you have thoughts or preferences please let me know (swright2@telus.net).

One of the major annual events of the chess year has just finished at Wijk aan Zee in Holland. The three main tournaments were fourteen-player round robins, won respectively by Levon Aronian, Vesselin Topalov, and Teimour Radjabov (Group A), Pavel Eljanov (Group B), and Michal Krasenkow (Group C). There was much coverage on the internet, particularly of Group A - see for example http://www.chessbase.com/. Both these sites have links to http://www.chessvibes.com/, where video of the players is available; the picture quality is not great, but where else can you see the likes of Kramnik, Topalov, Anand, and Svidler demonstrating the games they just played?

Apart from the grandmaster tournaments there are also many amateur events held at Wijk aan Zee at the same time. These include four-player round robins held over weekends, four-player round robins held on weekdays, ten-player round robins, active tournaments, and various special competitions for journalists, Dutch politicians, and seconds. One of the many participants in these events was James Taylor of North Vancouver, who scored 50% in a ten-player round robin.

VANCOUVER SUN CHESS COLUMN

The inclusion of chess columns in B.C. newspapers has always been a hit and miss affair, dependant upon economic conditions, the general level of interest in chess, and the availability of individuals willing and capable enough to write them. Some have lasted ten years or more: Davie/Piper in the *Colonist*, 1916-1931; Creemer/Fillery in the *Province*, 1947-1957; and more recently the columns by Ray Kerr, Bruce Harper, and (nationally) Jonathan Berry. Others survived only a year or even less, to disappear as quickly as they appeared.

One of the latter is a chess column that appeared in the *Vancouver Sun* at the very beginning of the 1930s. I was not aware the column even existed until I serendipitously came across it while searching for something rather different - a review of a Vancouver solo recital by the great Russian composer/pianist Sergei Rakhmaninov. Victoria had had a chess column since 1916, and Vancouver players were anxious to get a column for their own city (there had previously been one in the Vancouver Daily News Advertiser, but it only lasted just over two years, 1913-1915). The players got their wish on April 12, 1930, a Saturday, when a new chess column was first published in the Vancouver Sun. The editor was Bertram A. Yates, a four-time B.C. Champion and well-known member of the Vancouver Chess Club who had also edited the previous column in the Daily News Advertiser (see Bulletin #43 for more on him). Yates seemed to have based his column on what Piper was doing in the Colonist; each weekly publication included a chess problem (one a week and helpfully numbered, thus providing an easy way to keep track of the columns), a list of solvers of the previous week's problem, a couple of annotated games, and occasionally some chess news. The games were a mixture of local and international efforts, but what little chess news there was was almost entirely local. Maddingly from a historical point of view, often Yates mentions the beginning of a tournament or reports on its progress, but frequently nothing further is ever published about the event in question.

Some of the problems were by local composers; here are a pair of mates in two by members of the Vancouver Chess Club (White to move in both cases):

The column lasted until April 18, 1931, when without warning it ceased to appear. Piper's column in the *Colonist* lasted just over a month longer, until May 24, 1930 - likely both were victims of the Great Depression. Within the year of its existence Yates published some twenty-one local games; these will be added to BCBASE in due course, but for now here are four games which shed some light on the early playing style of Jack Taylor. The influence of Paul Morphy can be seen in some of Taylor's best games, with his reliance on development, a clear attacking style, and a good eye for combinations, but in some cases Taylor took matters to the point of recklessness. Defence technique in those days at the lower levels was not good so he generally triumphed, but such risky attacks would certainly not be successful in future decades. His play is reminiscent of a comment by W.E. Napier, who once wrote that [Rudolf] "Spielmann plays always like an educated cave-man, who fell asleep several thousand years ago, - and woke up quite lately in the Black Forest."
