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BACK TO SCHOOL OPEN

There have been some discussions in B.C. chess circles lately about the negative influence of ratings, particularly through too great an emphasis being placed on them. Use of a classification system instead of ratings is being contemplated, but as an experiment we decided to hold a weekend Swiss event that was completely unrated. The result was the Back to School Open, held at the Vancouver Bridge Centre on the weekend after Labour Day. The jury is still out on the success of the experiment - if the tournament had been rated, would more people have taken part? As it was, 15 players participated in the tournament: nine of those either are or have been over 2000, which makes a good "open" section for a weekend Swiss, but only a disappointing six class players came out. Do ratings mean more to class players? Can anything be inferred from so small a sample?

Despite the small turnout the tournament was competitive; going into the last round Lucas and Noam Davies were both a point ahead of the field with 3.5/4, but both lost to more experienced opponents in the final round (Luc Poitras and Roman Jiganchine respectively), resulting in a four-way tie for first. Michael Yip won the U2000 prize (yes, the event was unrated, but we had to decide the class prizes somehow). The tournament was a Katherine Davies/Stephen Wright co-production, with Wright doing (most) of the directing.



LABOUR DAY OPEN

This year's event was won by 15 year-old Bindi Cheng with the "typical" Labour Day score of 5.0-1.0 (see list of previous tournaments below). Bindi has recently moved to Burnaby from Hamilton, Ontario, and is a welcome addition to the B.C. chess scene. Second place was shared by two veterans who had strong performances, Paul Leblanc and Gerry Neufahrt - in fact, it is reported that Gerry would have won the tournament but for problems with the clock in his round 5 game against Harry Moore. Moore was the highest-rated player but was defeated by Cheng and Leblanc, while second-ranked visitor Roger Patterson from Gloucester, Ontario had an indifferent event and did not break the 50% mark after a loss to Evan Raymer in the first round. Held at the University of Victoria, the tournament only attracted 17 players, a continuation of the recent trend in declining turnouts; Lynn Stringer handled the directorial duties with her usual aplomb.

SUTTLES AT THE WORLD JUNIOR

In 1965 Canada's representative to the World Junior Championship was Duncan Suttles. Held in Barcelona in August, the tournament consisted of Preliminary and Final stages. In the preliminaries the 28 competitors were divided into five smaller round-robins, two of them having five players, the other three having six. Suttles ended up in the second of the five-player sections; for reasons which are not clear only Platzack had an equal distribution of colours, everyone else had three Whites out of four or three Blacks:

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Suttles wrote:

"My failure to qualify for the Championship section was the greatest setback I have ever experienced in chess. Everything depended on my last round game in the preliminary, where I had to beat L.M.O. Bronstein to qualify. Although I was very put out at the arrangement of preliminaries with only four games, you can well imagine the consternation of R.D. Keene, who had to <u>draw lots</u> wth Tukmakov to settle who was to play in the Championship section!

"Bronstein proved to be my personal nemesis, as he beat me to qualify, and then in an International Tournament at Gijon a little while later he beat me by half a point to win the first prize, though I had some consolation in a win over him with the Whites in our game at Gijon." [Canadian Chess Chat, October 1965]

This relative failure meant that Suttles competed in the "B" Finals, winning it without loss of a game ahead of England's Raymond Keene. Kurajica went on to win the World Junior title in the ten-player "A" Final, beating future GMs Vladimir Tukmakov, Robert Hübner, and Ivan Farago in the process - not a bad result!
