LOCAL GOES UNDEFEATED by Peter Kerek

Ben Kruger of Kamloops upset the top seeds in the Kamloops Fall Classic Chess Tournament to tie for first. Kruger was ecstatic, jumping in celebration after defeating Kelowna's Mike Lepsoe in the final round to secure at least a tie for first. Expert David Moore of Sicamous went 5 - 1 to share first with Kruger. Kruger, a former expert, hasn't performed as well in recent years but certainly pulled it together this weekend.

Lepsoe was a surprise winner of the under 1700 section. Lepsoe hasn't competed in a CFC tournament in four years and was the lowest rated player to enter. "I was shocked. He actually requested a bye in the fourth round so he could go partying Saturday night at Harvest-fest in Celista - most players are pretty focused during the weekend of a tournament," said Kerek. "I thought he'd be rusty, but he must have been keeping up by studying or computer play - he'll be one to watch for in upcoming tournaments."

Organizer Peter Kerek would like to extend a big thanks to the BCGEU for donating the use of the Russ Saarich Room to host the tournament. "The venue's just right for our tournaments and allows most of the entry money to go right back into the prize fund," said Kerek.

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The Sunday Open for October attracted eighteen players, one less than the September event. Draws on the top two boards in the last round resulted in a four-way tie for first, between Lucas Davies, Vaclav Sladek, Noam Davies, and Michael Yip; each scored 2.5/3. Stoyan Petrov won the U1800 prize, Aviv Milner continued his good results of late by placing second.

The U1500 junior section was won by newcomer Jorge Prieto with a perfect score, second was Alexandra Botez (3/4); the U1100 prize was split between Foster Tom and Dylan Parker. And for the first time in many a moon, the Booster section did not require tiebreaks to decide the allocation of the three trophies available: they went to David Choi (4.5/5), Alejandro Torres-Lopez (4), and Janak Awatramani (3.5) respectively.

Forty players in total took part in the three sections, held at the Vancouver Bridge Centre on October 20.

EMANUEL LASKER IN SEATTLE, 1926

In the spring of 1926 former world champion Emanuel Lasker visited the Pacific northwest; it was hoped he would present a simultaneous display in Victoria, but these plans fell through. Instead, he gave two displays in Seattle; the second of these was refereed by Thomas Piper of Victoria (see Bulletin #5 for biographical information). The following report appeared in the *Victoria Daily Colonist* chess column on March 28, 1926 - Piper was the editor:

"Dr. Lasker may say with Caesar, Veni Vidi Vici, anant his thiry-board simultaneous display at the Elks, Seattle, on March 18, for, as already reported, he won twenty-four, lost two and drew four. Mr. T.H. Hall, president of the Elks Chess Club, organized the match and elicited the admiration of all Seattle and visiting chessists for the perfect working of his arrangements.

Chess is played in Seattle at the Faculty Club, University of Washington, Seattle Chess Club, Assembly Hotel, Elks Club, College Club, Masonic Club and the Y.M.C.A.; all seven loyally supported him with their best players, and such solid financial backing that a surplus remains after paying Dr. Lasker \$140, \$15 more than he charged.

The chapel of the Elks, a noble apartment, with a beautiful organ, lit by radiation of concealed lights gave eclat to the seance.

Dr. Lasker was conducted from his hotel to the chapel by the referee, and received a tremendous ovation. The president announced that the laws of chess would be strictly enforced by the chess editor of *The Colonist*; this was accorded a loud cheer. No player to touch a piece until the performer faced the board, and no consultation, but Dr. Lasker would rather lose a good game than win a bad one, and at this suggestion consultation was allowed.



The Master is about five feet, six inches high and about 160 pounds in weight, the face like those of the original conjurors of Palestine, a very large nose, eyes which almost fascinate, with a fierce glare when playing, but relax into a most kindly smile when conversing, the leonine glare becoming a peaceful, friendly, intellectual contemplation.

On fifteen boards lasker moved first, on the other fifteen his opponents attacked. He lost a Vienna to Maltby, and Arvid Johnson defended a Ruy Lopez with classical accuracy, winning in thiry-two moves and three hours fifteen minutes. Maltby, the other winner, took three hours forty-five minutes.

Hulback, of the Elks, defended splendidly, and drew by perpetual check. Storkmarrs, who drew with Dr. Lasker in Copenhagen, drew in Seattle; Sheets and C.B. Bagley, of the S.C.C., also drew; the latter played scores of games with the writer in 1889-93, and at eighty-two years of age plays with the freshness and vigor of

nineteen-year youths like Johnson, Storkmarrs and Sheets, who will go far. Baseler, ace of the Elks, was the last to lose of the twenty-four victims of the chess Moloch.

An air of well-bred decorum prevaded the chapel, much like the St. George's C.C., the club of the peers.

Lasker moved swiftly, never more than a few seconds at a board as a rule, but at the Maltby and Johnson games he arched his eyebrows, tugged at his ample locks, and spent two minutes at a move, evidently exerting all his great power.

The organizer was heartily congratulated, and new members joined both the Elks and the S.C.C."

"Maltby, a veteran, was awarded the honor of playing the best game of the evening after a consultation between Dr. Lasker and Mr. Thomas Piper, of Victoria, who acted as referee:"
