This year's event in memory of Jack Taylor saw the return to Victoria of WFM Valeriya Gansvind, who deservedly took first place with 3.5/4. Unfortunately this coincided with the smallest turnout for the tournament in recent memory; normally the Jack Taylor draws between twelve and twenty-four players, but this year it sank to a discouraging new low of ten, including TD Lynn Stringer. Whether there is any particular reason for this I don't know (the WA Class Championships did not seem to have a significant effect), but tournament attendence in general has been lower this year - something for the BCCF executive to give careful consideration to. The event was held as usual at the University of Victoria, this time in the Clearihue Building, which proved to be a good site. Many thanks to Lynn Stringer, who continues to organize and direct events, despite having done so for many years already. Players, don't take your organizers for granted - come out and support them!

The main Canadian beneficiary of the event was Junior Champion Lucas Davies, who placed clear second overall with 4/6, a half point behind winner Nick Raptis. Other B.C. participants were Noam Davies, Louie Jiang, Severo Caluza, Alexandra Botez, and Donovan Zhao. B.C. - WASHINGTON MATCHES

The next two weekends see the renewal of formal chess competition between the province of British Columbia and the state of Washington. First is the adult match on ten boards, to be played at Bellingham on December 3 (weather permitting). This is the third match in the modern series (the main matches were held 1944-1963); B.C. won in both 2003 and 2004 with identical 6-4 scores, but this year the beefed-up Washington squad will be looking for revenge:

"TOUGH AS NAILS" - LEO DUVAL

A B.C. historical figure who has largely been forgotten is Leo Manners Duval (April 1, 1888 - February 20, 1976). One of B.C.'s strongest players in the 1940s, he won the B.C. Championship in 1941, 1942, 1943, and 1946, and on the CFC rating list in 1957 he was second in B.C., considerably behind Miervaldis Jursevskis but just ahead of Gerry Neufahrt - this at the age of sixty-nine! More research is needed, as many details of his life remain unknown, but Duval was born in Lake Megantic, Quebec, served in the First World War (where he rose to the rank of lieutenant and won the Military Cross), and worked as a civil engineer. I do not know when he moved to Vancouver, but he took part in a match against Seattle in 1938. Paul Brown

remembers playing Duval: "Nigel Fullbrook and I were members of the Kerrisdale Chess Club in the late 60's and 70's. I recall him telling me one evening on the way home that he played this very old player that evening and found him to be quite formidable. He told me that this guy was tough as nails. I played the elderly gentleman the following week and asked Mr. E. C. Boire, the club organizer, what the gentleman's name was. He told me that it was "Mr. Duval." I estimate that he was in his late 80's or early 90's at the time. Although Nigel and I played him several times after that, I don't recall if I was ever lucky enough to beat him."

Apart from his provincial championship wins, perhaps Duval's most prominent result was his showing in the 1945 Canadian Championship. This was only the second time that B.C. had representation at a Canadian championship (the first was John Ewing at Hamilton, 1924); Jack Taylor finished 9th, but Duval was alone in 5th place, and only lost one game - to Taylor!

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The tournament was largely a battle between the top four finishers, who all scored 8.5/9 against the rest of the field - but the player they all drew against was Duval. These were not grandmaster draws either, as the games below will attest; it should also be remembered that Duval was fifty-seven years old at the time.

Those with a B.C. connection: Roy (CFC president) and MacAdam both moved here in later life, Taylor and Duval were provincial champions, Divinsky and Helman played as Manitoba representatives in this event, but both moved to Vancouver. Helman was B.C. champion in 1947 and 1948 before dying suddenly in 1952, Divinsky is alive and well and living at UBC.
