HERE AND THERE

BC Active Championship (April 22-23)



Last held as an online tournament in 2020, the BC Active Championship for 2023 was organized by [Vancity Chess](#) and held at one of their regular locations, the Banquet Hall of the Thompson Community Centre in Richmond. Normal Vancity rapid events are single day affairs, six rounds of 15 + 10; in this case the number of rounds was increased to eight, spread over two days. The thirty-five player Open Section included seven players rated over 2000, head by IMs Raymond Kaufman and Vicente Lee Jr., CM Jorge Nunez Asencio, and NMs Neil Doknjas and David Miller. Despite this assemblage of talent it was Raymond Kaufman who cut through the field, scoring a perfect 8.0/8 in claiming the first prize. Jorge Nunez Asencio was clear second with 6.5, and Neil Doknjas and Zachary Liu tied for third a further point back. Curiously several of the rounds featured a predominance of wins by a given colour: black scored eight wins on the first eleven boards in round three, white had the same 8.0/11 score in round five, 12.0/14 in round 6, and 8.5/11 in round seven, while the last round belonged to black with nine wins on the top ten boards. The U1400 Section had fifty entrants and was won by Pascal Moore-Arbour and Narek Bobloyan who tied with 6.5 points each, just ahead of Garth Anderson, Arnav Shetty, and Daniel Zhu who tied for third. World School Chess Championships (April 14-22)



First held in Halkidiki, Greece in 2005, the World School Chess Championships fill in the age group gaps left by the larger and more prestigious World Cadet/Youth Championships. That is, the latter are divided into sections based on even two-year age brackets (U08, U10, U12, U14, U16, U18), whereas the World School Championships employ the same two-year brackets but beginning with the odd ages (U07, U09, U11, U13, U15, U17). In both cases there are separate open and girls divisions, leaving the school event with a total of twelve sections.

The event has not often had participants from Canada (one notable exception being last year when FM Johnathan Han won the Open U13 Section), but this year eight Canadian players travelled to Rhodes, Greece to attend, including the newly-crowned BC Grade 1 Champion Elliot McCallum. Playing in the thirty-five player U07 Open Section, Elliot racked up eight wins to take clear first place (he was also winning in the other game, but his concentration was disturbed having to record in time trouble when the necessity to keep score was not universally applied). He can now add 2023 World U07 Open Champion to his resume – congratulations! Other Canadians were not as fortunate: Deshpande Sarthak (U11), Elizabeth Nagnibedovsky (G07) and April Yunwei Zhong (G15) all finished in fourteenth place in their respective sections after scoring 5.5, 5.0, and 4.5 points, while Johnathan Han's 5.0 was only good enough for nineteenth place this year. Fraser Valley Women and Senior Open (April 15)

This innovative tournament from the Fraser Valley Chess Academy featured three conjunct components, six-round rapid sections for women and seniors and a twelve-round open blitz event. Ten players participated in the Womens' Open, won by Katrina Shearon with a perfect score ahead of Sofia Vigurs in second and Ivory Daffurn and Annika Nicolle tied for third. Top-rated senior champion Mayo Fuentebella gave up two draws in the first two rounds but nevertheless won the Seniors' Open ahead of Gerhard Reuter and Besnik Beqo who tied for second. And Mayo also managed to win the twenty-two player Open Blitz event, closely followed by Azael Navarro Jimenez second and Daniel Folster third. [Women Senior Blitz](#)

Canadian Championship (April 6-11)

In December of 2018 the CFC Directors approved a bid from Aris Marghetis to hold the next four Canadian Championships in Kingston, Ontario. The first of these duly took place at Easter 2019, but then the pandemic struck. After an online event in 2021 the second Kingston Championship took place last year, but since then Aris has experienced serious health issues and was forced to abandon the remaining Kingston tournaments. Into the breach step the Excelsior Chess Club, a new club in Toronto founded and owned by Nick Oancea, which hosted both the Canadian Closed Championship and the Canadian Women's Championship. This year the Closed was not a Zonal so direct titles were unavailable, yet the tournament attracted twenty-six entrants, headed by GMs Bator Sambuev and Razvan Preotu and IMs Nikolay Noritsyn and Shawn Rodrigue-Lemieux, all rated over 2500. They all finished at the top of the crosstable: Noritsyn, Rodrigue-Lemieux, and Sambuev tied for first with 7.5 points, losing to each other and giving up a single draw to another player elsewhere in the field. (Their names are given in tiebreak order, perhaps with the 2017 Sambuev-Noritsyn encounter still in mind, no playoffs this year.) Preotu was alone in clear fourth place a point back, having lost

twice to the victorious triumvirate. Also participating were three junior players from BC, Aiden Zhou, Jingyun (Ryan) Yang, and Ethan Song; Ryan and Ethan scored 50%, while Aiden was half point behind them. All three had performance ratings in the high 2290s, and Aiden managed to earn a draw against Sambuev. [CFC crosstable chess-results](#)

INTERMAT (April 15)



The 2023 INTERMAT, the first in-person version since 2019, was held at Lansdowne Centre in Richmond. The INTERMAT is a cross-border match, annual since 1991, between school-aged children representing BC and Washington. The teams are comprised of two players each from grades 1-12 plus kindergarten, who play one game each with their corresponding numbers on the other team. Traditionally BC has scored heavily in the upper grades, Washington in the lower, but a more important factor is the respective teams' difficulty in recruiting their best lineup when playing away from home (except for the past three years when it was held online, the match alternates between BC and Washington). Indeed, one scheduled Washington player was unable to attend, so it was decided to play the grade 5 mini-match on only one board.

The teams were evenly balanced for much of the first round (BC white on all boards), and it was only in the fourth hour of play that BC pulled ahead by 4.0 points to take a 14.5-10.5 lead at the half. In round two the WA players had white and used that advantage to cut BC's lead to just a single point, but the BC team fought back and achieved the 25.5 points needed to win the match with five games to spare. The final score was 28.0-22.0 in BC's favour.

This year BC's lowest grades (K-4), aided by strong performances in Kindergarten and grade 3, suffered only a minimal defeat by one point in the twenty games they played, 9.5-10.5. In grades 5-8 WA outscored the home team by the slimmest of margins, 6.5-7.5, but in the highest grades BC dominated by 12.0-4.0. BC won eight of the mini-matches by grade (K, 3, 5, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12), Washington only four (1, 4, 6, 7), with just one tie (2). In terms of individual results, BC's Kai

Zhongkai Zhang and Lucas Yao swept their Washington grade 3 opponents, as did Jingyun (Ryan) Yang and Ethan Song in grade 8 and Neil Doknjas and Patrick Huang in grade 12. Other BC players with a perfect score were Daniel Zhu (K) and Andrew Yu Qiu (11), while Aiden Leong (9) and Kate Jiang (10) had plus scores. On the Washington side, Odbayar Yondon and Michael Xiong (4) and Nikash Vemparala and Stephen Willy (7) swept their BC counterparts, Terrick Evin (1), Samarth Bharadwaj (2), Jamie Zhu (6) also scored two wins, Chen Yuan (1) scored 1.5 points.

The match was organized by Michael Lo and Stephen Wright on the BC side, Josh Sinanan and Chouchanik Airapetian for Washington; the team captains were John Jiang and Hattie Su (BC) and Chouchanik Airapetian (Washington). The chief arbiter was Stephen Wright. Sponsors were chess2inspire – many thanks to all. [Match website](#); [previous results](#) Overall Washington now has a 16-14 lead in match victories, with two ties. Chess2Inspire also organized a multi-player simultaneous exhibition at the same location which went over well with the general public.

GRAND PACIFIC OPEN (April 7-10)

The 2023 Grand Pacific Open, the 16th annual, blew away all previous attendance records with two hundred and thirty-eight players. Not quite full capacity of the venue but definitely on the way there. I can remember when we were over the moon at having eighty-three players in the 2nd annual - now that would be rather disappointing. As with pre-pandemic versions of the event, players came from all over, representing five provinces and four US states coast to coast. Alberta in particular sent a strong contingent and walked off with most of the top places.

The strength of the field was similar to previous versions but perhaps with a deeper bench of masters. The masters had a hard time of it though with numerous upsets and spent more time on the lower boards than usual. The deciding game for first place occurred rather surprisingly in round two. IM Quang Long Le, a fairly new arrival on the BC scene, was a pre-tournament favourite with a 2453 rating. He achieved an edge in his game against Omid Malek and as seems to be his style, patiently massaged the position with the edge ranging from nominal to nearly winning. Then the "accident" happened.....

White has had a pleasant edge for a while – space advantage, Black has a miserable white-squared bishop, but now goes astray with 52.Rb6 Re6 equalizing. 53.Bd3 c5! 54.Rb5 b6! 55.axb6?? It was time to bail with something like Rhb1. 55...Bb7 and out go the lights.
