HERE AND THERE

WYCC (November 13-24)

This year the World Youth Chess Championships, the upper three categories (U14, U16, U18) of FIDE's two-year age group championships, was held in Montesilvano on Italy's Adriatic Coast, at a similar latitude to Rome on the west. Almost eight hundred and fifty players participated in the event, including fourteen from Canada and two from this province, Andrew Yu Qiu and Peter Yong Qiu in the U18 Open category. The competition was tough and gruelling (eleven rounds) – GM Volodar Murzin (FIDE 2625) was an entrant in the U18 Open but did not win it. Andrew and Peter finished with 4.0 and 5.0 points respectively, placing 116th and 96th in the two hundred and seventeen player section. Best Canadian scores were achieved by Michelle Zhang (7.0 points, 22nd in U14 Girls), CM Leo Lin (6.5 points, 50th in U14 Open), and FM Daniel Xu (also 6.5, 29th in U16 Open). Standings

Fall 2023 GM/IM Norm Invitationals (November 17-21)

The Charlotte Chess Center in North Carolina has been running biannual norm tournaments for a number of years – indeed, it was this time last year that Max Gedajlovic earned his second IM norm in the Fall 2022 events. This Fall there were four norm round robins, two for GM aspirants

and two for IM norms, which included four Canadians: FM Zachary Dukic, IM Max Gedajlovic, FM William Graif, and NM Ethan Song. Only one norm was achieved, in IM C, where William Graif scored 7.0/9 for his first IM norm. Ethan Song, playing in the same section, could only manage 4.0 points but did beat Graif in the last round. Dukic placed second in IM D with 6.0 points, while Max scored minus one in GM B. Fraser Valley Rapid 9 (November 18)



The weekend of November 18-19 was a busy one for chess, with at least four events happening locally (Langley, Richmond, West Vancouver, and Burnaby). Almost two hundred players participated in the BC Junior, which meant the other events were likely to be considerably smaller than usual. Fraser Valley Rapid 9, held as usual at the Christian Life Assembly Church in Langley, attracted thirty-nine entrants and was held in two sections rather than the usual three. In the U1400 Section Sion Park was only ranked fifteenth but claimed first prize with 5.5 points, a half-point ahead of Rio Vilches in second while third was Karim Elbably; Nimit Naman was the top U1100. Three players tied on 5.0 points in the U1000 Section, with Hector Abad, Aaron Creor, and Corrigan Brown placing first, second, and third after tiebreaks were applied. Games

Also on November 18 was the Vancity Fall Rapid, held in the lounge of Bethany Baptist Church in Richmond. The twenty-five player Open Section had five players over 2000, including IM Vicent Lee jr., CM Jorge Nunez Asencio, and NM Mayo Fuentebella, but it was newly-crowned BC Champion CM Neil Doknjas (right) who carried the day, giving up but a single draw to Jorge in scoring 5.5 points and taking first place. Mayo was second and Jorge third; Vicente had an off day, losing to James Rife who we gather is taking lessons from former BC champion Bruce Harper. The U1400 Section, reduced to a baker's dozen of players, was won by Cole Newton with a perfect score ahead of Scott Parsley and Daniel O'Mahony. Banff Open (November 10-12)



Now in it's seventh year, the <u>2023 Banf Open</u> saw another record turnout of one hundred and thirty-one players, including from this province Johan Aljo, Quinton Burrows, Zachary Burrows, Gilles Bruneau, Zachary Chruszcz, Christopher Englehart, Harold Glendale, Elijah Harmes, Reece Harms, Riley Harms, Steve Harms, Raymond Kaufman, Aiden Leong, Scott Malachi, Elliot McCallum, Siobhan McCallum, Chris McKim, Kevin Moore, Oliver Olivar, Leon Piasetski, Dejan Radic, Marko Radic, Nathan Ping-Ying Wu, Nicholas Pei-Chang Wu, Joey Xin, Joanne Xu, Ryan Bole Yu, and Brandon Zhu. Highest ranked was IM Mark Ginsburg who had previously won the tournament in 2017 and 2018 (also the 2018 Grand Pacific Open), but it was IM Raymond Kaufman who had at least a share of first for the entire event. Despite this, NM Anand Chandra from Calgary won his last three games (including defeating Ginsberg in round five) to tie with

Kaufman with 5.0 points. The custom in Banff is to decide a first-play tie with an Armageddon game – Anand won and is the Banff Open Champion for this year. Elsewhere IM Leon Piasetski tied for third a half-point off the pace, Elliot McCallum tied for sixth overall in the <u>U2000 Section</u> and gained 300 rating points, and Oliver Olivar tied for first in the <u>U1600 Section</u>.

Rapid Chess Tournament WV (November 5)

The latest rapid event organized by Luc Poitras at the West Vancouver United Church attracted seventeen players, including three former BC champions. IM Raymond Kaufman won with five wins in six games, his only loss coming to German exchange student Maximilian Mueller in the fifth round. Second, a mere half point behind, was Bhell Ortiz, while Zachary Liu, Zhengyu Chen, and Mueller tied for third on 4.0 points. The next such event is scheduled for <u>December 17</u>.

World Senior Championship (October 25 – November 5)



Youth and age – like the WYCC mentioned above, this year's <u>World Senior Championships</u> were held in Italy, specifically Terrasini, a suburb of Palermo on the island of Sicily. Some two hundred and fifty players competed in the 50+, 65+ and women's categories including nine Canadians, IMs David Cummings and Thanh Nha Duong, FMs Dale Haessel, Marcel Milat, and Victor Plotkin, and David Filipovich and Yves Morin in the 50+ category, and IM Leon Piasetski and Ian Finlay in the 65+. Both categories had clear favourites in English GMs Michael Adams and John Nunn; both finished first, but had to go to tiebreaks to do so. In the 50+ Adams tied for first with GM Suat Atalik on 8.5/11 and needed the third tiebreak to claim first place. Top Canadian was Cummings who tied for fifth place with 7.5 points, while Plotkin and Haessel both scored 6.0 points. 1999 BC Champion

Marcel Milat has only returned to chess recently; he scored 50% without playing the last two rounds, but he and Plotkin had the satisfaction of drawing with American GM Maxim Dlugy in consecutive rounds. John Nunn became 65+ champion on the second tiebreak after he and GM Lubomir Ftacnik both scored 8.5 points – older readers may remember Ftacnik as winner of the 1991 and 1992 Keres Memorial tournaments at Robson Square. Leon Piasetski did not have a good event and stopped playing after the rest day following round six.

In the blitz event Zachary Liu had a scary performance, giving up just a single draw in thirteen rounds to place first with 12.5 points. Second a point and a half back was Ryan Leong, while even further back were llan Keshet and Mayo Fuentebella. Twenty-nine players participated.

Langley Chess Club Championship (October 2-30) by Brian Davidson

In October, the Langley Chess Club held its first <u>championship tournament</u> since 2019. It was a six round Swiss attended by twelve club members. When the dust had settled, fifteen-year-old Kai Johannes Kwabi was the winner with a score of 4.0/5. Second place was a tie between James Kerry and Brian Davidson, at 3.5/5. Kai is one of a handful of juniors to win the Langley Club title, joining John and Neil Doknjas and Tanraj Sohal.

2023 BC JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP (November 18-19)

Held once more under the auspices of the Chess2Inspire organization and held at the Bonsor Recreation Complex in Burnaby, the BC Junior Championship kept the same format as in recent years: a Championship Section (rated over 1300 CFC), a Reserve Section (rated over 700) and a Booster (under 700 or unrated). The biggest difference this year was the time control in the Booster; normally it is a one day, rapid-style event, but as a separate room was not available all three sections used the same time controls – 50 + 10 on the Saturday and 90 + 30 on Sunday. The thirty-nine player Championship Section included three masters and eight players over 2000 but Jingyun (Ryan) Yang was the class of the field, becoming BC Junior Champion with a convincing 5.0/5 and also qualifying for next year's BC Closed. Tied for second with 4.0 points were Reece Harms and Matthew He, with Reece getting the nod on tiebreaks. Reece also pushed his rating over 2000 for the first time – not bad for someone whose first tournament was less than eighteen months ago. Kate Jiang was the Top Girl, Frank Zhou and Andre Dossa were First and Second U1800 respectively (despite both being U1500), Henry Zhou and Huy Minh Vu claimed the U1500 prizes and Abigail Wang was the Top Girl U1800.

The Reserve Section attracted sixty-nine entrants and resulted in a three-way tie at the top between Ethan Jun Low, Aadit Arya, and Panshul Mishra Jaiman – each scored 4.5 points. After tiebreaks were applied Ethan was First, Panshul Second, and Aadit the First U1000. Joanne Wangluo was the Top Girl, Ryder Hsu Second U1000, and Joanne's sister May Wangluo the Top Girl U1000. The Booster Section was the largest of the three sections with ninety participants. There were, in total, twenty-one prizes. Errol Zeng, Entong Tian, Karson Lu, Kanav Singh Kapur, and Zhenhao Li placed First to Fifth respectively, while Top Girls overall were Siyona Singh and Joanne Xu. For U500 Yunhao Tan, Zi Tian Chen, Alexander Lu, Joonki Park, and Vincent Tian were the place winners, and Genevieve Tang and Rayna Li were the Top Girls, while for unrated players Gaoqi Zhang, Derek Xu, Seshadri Sai Sowmiya Narayanan, Joel Lee, and Yuziang Su won the place prizes and Kay Leung and Hannah Rajaei were the Top Girls.

VANCOUVER CHESS FESTIVAL #3 (November 11-12)

There were a few tweaks to the format of Vancouver Chess School Festival #3: the time control for the Classical Open was changed from 60 + 30 to 50 + 10, same as the other Classical Sections, to allow for five rounds over the weekend. And the Blitz event was replaced this time by the first Regional Qualifier for the 2023-34 Canadian Chess Challenge. Festival #3 occurred on the Remembrance Day weekend at UBC's Ponderosa Ballroom which coincided with the Banff Open and the Jack Taylor Memorial (Sidney) but still managed to attract one hundred and five players in five sections. The thirteen player Classical Open was won by Jingyun (Ryan) Yang with 4.5/5, a full point ahead of Zachary Liu, Erwin Mok, and Felipe Komatu who tied for second and third. Bhell Ortiz won the Classical U1800 for a second time, although this time he gave up a quick last-round draw; Jofrel Landingin and Richard Ingram tied for second. And Markus Li was the perfect winner of the Classical U1000, followed by Rafael Yen and Jason Han. Only four entered the Rapid Open so the section was run as a double round robin. IM Vicente Lee jr. repeated his victory from the previous festival by scoring three wins and three draws while Leo Qu and Tadas Ceponis tied for second place. Finally, the Rapid U1400 saw newcomer Cole Louie take the top prize with a perfect score, Alex Yu was second, and Ben Wang third. Watch for Vancouver Chess Festival #4 next weekend.

2023 JACK TAYLOR MEMORIAL (November 11-12) by Paul Leblanc Jason Williamson and Amirmasoud Tirehkar Notch Perfect Scores

This year's Jack Taylor Memorial, the thirty-eighth in a series dating back to <u>1984</u>, was held at the Mary Winspear Community Centre in Sidney on the weekend of 11-12 November. Attendance (fifty-three players) was the lowest since 2015 for various reasons. On the plus side, spacing in the tournament room was quite generous and the prize fund was not scooped up by the usual chess

masters. Jason Williamson of Nanaimo had an impressive tournament and some quite exciting games including an incredible come-from-behind victory against Peter Mingrone and a queen sacrifice against NM Roger Patterson. He finished at 5.0-0.0 and a \$600 first prize.

Peter Mingrone of Victoria, Ryan Leong of Richmond and Amadeus Matz, visiting from Germany tied for second in the <u>Premier Section</u>, at 4.0-1.0, one point behind Williamson. The <u>U1200 Section</u> was won with a 5.0-0.0 score by Amirmasoud Tirehkar of Victoria, a new and welcome addition to the local chess scene. Micah Chow of Vancouver finished second at 4.0-1.0.

VANCOUVER CHESS FESTIVAL #2 (October 28-29)

The Vancouver Chess School's Festival #2 followed exactly the same format as Festival #1 the previous month – Classical, Rapid, and Blitz events in seven individual sections and a \$5,500 guaranteed prize fund. The weekend also coincided with a full moon. Whether this had any effect on the games is unclear, but at 7:06pm on the Sunday evening, while a round of the Blitz tournament was in progress and games from the Classical Open were finishing up, the fire alarm sounded. Clocks were paused and the Ponderosa Ballroom evacuated; it took the fire department thirty minutes to determine the cause was a burnt meal in the kitchen of a nearby student residence before we were allowed to continue.

The nineteen-player <u>Classical Open</u> included nine players over 2000 and a time control of 60 + 30. Top-ranked IM Raymond Kaufman lost in the first round to Ashton Taylor, and after three rounds it was Nathan Ping-Ying Wu who led the field with a perfect score. In the last round he was paired with his closest rival, CM Arpak Mohammed Qanee; Arpak won to claim the first prize, while Nathan had to be content with sharing the second and third prizes with Raymond, Tadas Ceponis, and Aiden Leong. The other two Classical Sections were played at the minimum time control for regular rating, 50 + 10. Bhell Ortiz put up a perfect picket fence in winning the <u>U1800 Section</u> 5.0/5, while Gideon Tang, Boyong Guo, Daniel Dou, Dawson Yamasaki, Tony Dong, and Henry Zhou shared the remaining prizes. And it was a four-way tie for first in the <u>U1000 Section</u> between May Wangluo, Evan Geng, Aiden Lu, and Tiago Ferraz.

Ties were also the order of the day in the Rapid Sections. IM Vicente Lee jr. managed to stay a half-point ahead of NM Mayo Fuentebella to win the Rapid Open, Mayo was second, while Kevin Low, Jingyun (Ryan) Yang, Henry Yang, and Caden Gee spit the third prize. The U1400 Rapid resulted in victory for Seyed Hamidreza Mirpoorian with a perfect score, and the quartet of Nijat Ibrahimov, Rio Vilches, Eamon Sheung, and Alex Xu. And finally, the Blitz Open saw Zachary Liu defeat IM Raymond Kaufman in the last round to claim first, while Raymond split second and third

with Leo Qu. In the <u>Blitz U1400</u> Dasha Doroshenko and Yuan Jaydon tied for first, Mark Karaivanov was third, and medals were won by Hector Moses (U1000), Jasper Chen (U600), and Daniel Musakhanyan (unrated).
