29TH PAUL KERES MEMORIAL



Another year has passed, another Keres Memorial . . . and another tournament victory for IM Georgi Orlov!

This year's event, held at the Croatian Community Centre, developed into a two-way race between Orlov and our own Jack Yoos, but in the last round Jack decided not to put WFM Valeriya Gansvind's technique to the test and agreed to a draw, allowing Orlov to take first with 6.5 points out of 7. Yoos placed second with 6, while there was a six-way tie for third place between visiting IM Vitomir Arapovic, Valeriya Gansvind, Fanhao Meng, Dragoljub Milicevic, Joe Oszvald, and Eduardo Daroza - they all scored 4.5 points. This means that Orlov has now placed first four years in a row and six times overall, thus surpassing the five first place finishes previously obtained by IM John Donaldson.

The Under 2000 Section was won convincingly by newcomer Vicente Lee with a perfect score, while Curtis Lister and Andrey Kostin tied for second with 5 points. In the Under 1600 Section another unrated player came first, Brian Bowes with 5.5/6; Richard Gaulin, Tiffany Tang, and Alan Forsyth tied for second a point back. The tournament attracted a total of 98 players; playing conditions were generally good, allowing for a rather noisy concert next door on the Friday night. There was also a special award presented to Lynn Stringer before the last round, the Estonian-Canadian Medal of Merit, awarded "for her outstanding contribution to Canadians of Estonian heritage by helping organize the Paul Keres Memorial Chess Tournaments." The actual presentation was made by Alar Suurkask on behalf of the Estonian Central Council in Canada.

CANADIAN CHESS CHALLENGE

Also occurring over the Victoria Day weekend was the National Chess Challenge, held this year in Winnipeg. This is a team event; each province sends one champion from each grade (12 in total) to do battle with the respective champions from the other provinces. B.C. finished fourth this year with 60 points (out of a possible 108), although only 2 extra points would have placed us in third.

VANCOUVER JUNIOR GRAND PRIX

The eighth and final event in the Vancouver junior Grand Prix took place at the Vancouver Bridge Centre on May 16. Three-way ties were the order of the day; in the Open Section Fanhao Meng and the father and daughter combination of Evgeni and Valentina Goutor tied for first with 2.5 points. The U1800 prize also resulted in a three-way tie, between Andrey Kostin, Manuel Escandor, and Ivan Petrov. Ivan had an especially good tournament, beating both Noam and Lucas Davies in the first two rounds (Lucas chose an inopportune moment to try the King's Indian Defence for the first time in his life) before finally losing to Valentina.

In the U1500 Section there was a another three-way tie for first, between Stefan Trandafir, Vlad Gaciu, and Alexandra Botez; Stoyan Petrov won the 2nd U1200 prize (on his own!). And the Booster Section saw - you guessed it - a three-way tie; taking home trophies were Alex Sabaratnam, Donovan Zhao, and Arifa Jessa.

The final Grand Prix standings will be published in the next Bulletin; the prize-giving ceremony will take place at the Year-end junior event at the Vancouver Bridge Centre on June13.

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1967: KERES AND SPASSKY IN B.C.

Everyone is aware that Vancouver 1975 was Paul Keres' last tournament appearance, hence the holding of the Paul Keres Memorial in his memory. However, Keres also visited B.C. in 1967; to celebrate the Canadian centenary a grandmaster event was organized in Winnipeg, which included the participation of the Soviet players Boris Spassky and Paul Keres. While in Canada Spassky and Keres gave simultaneous displays in various locations, including B.C.; here is a report that appeared in the November 1967 issue of *Canadian Chess Chat*:

"On Saturday, October 14th, both grandmasters gave an exhibition in Nanaimo. Mr. Spassky played ten opponents with clocks and won all games. Mr. Keres played 23 opponents in the usual simultaneous way. He won 22 games and drew one (Bryant).

On Sunday, October 15th, both grandmasters gave an exhibition at the Vancouver City Chess Club. Mr. Spassky played 23 opponents; he won 2 games and drew one (Le Compte from Washington). Mr. Keres played 23 opponents; he won 17 games, drew two (Schneider, Wuentschek) and lost four (Berry, Harper, Overas, Pitt - the last two from Washington).

On Tuesday, October 17th, Mr. Spassky gave an exhibition in North Vancouver. He played 17 opponents; he won 45 games and drew two (Mrs. L'Hirondelle, Mr. Savchenko). On the same evening Mr. Keres gave an exhibition in New Westminster; he played 46 opponents. He won 45 games and drew one (R. Zuk)."

"Jonathan Berry, 14, and Bruce Harper, 13, both pupils at Sentinel Secondary School, bested the Soviet grandmaster during an exhibition at the Mount Pleasant Community Centre . . . Keres said today he did not remember his matches with the schoolboys and does not keep scores of his exhibition games. 'But I guess they kept the scores and will remember for a long time,' Keres commented. 'If that is the case, then I am glad they enjoyed the games.'" [*Vancouver Sun*, October 16, 1967]

Boris Spassky on Paul Keres:

"I loved Paul Petrovitch with a kind of special, filial feeling. Honesty, correctness, discipline, diligence, astonishing modesty – these were the characteristics that caught the eye of the people who came into contact with Keres during his lifetime. But there was also something mysterious about him. I had an acute feeling that Keres was carrying some kind of a heavy burden all through his life. Now I understand that this burden was the infinite love for the land of his ancestors, an attempt to endure all the ordeals, to have full responsibility for his every step. I have never met a person with an equal sense of responsibility. This man with internally free and independent character was at the same time a very well disciplined person. Back then I did not realise that it is discipline that largely determines internal freedom.

For me, Paul Keres was the last Mohican, the carrier of the best traditions of classical chess and – if I could put it this way – the Pope of chess.

Why did he not become the champion? I know it from personal experience that in order to reach the top, a person is thinking solely of the goal, he has to forget everything else in this world, toss aside everything unnecessary – or else you are doomed. How could Keres forget everything else?"

Keres' games from Vancouver 1975 are readily available, so to round out this article here are two tournament games against the B.C. players who went on to become OTB grandmasters:
