VANCOUVER CHESS CLUB

Various entities have held the name "Vancouver Chess Club" through the years, some more successful than others (for one of the unsuccessful ones see Bulletin #38). There have been chess clubs in Vancouver since at least the mid-1890s, but the first one of substance came into being in early 1913, in response to a letter published in the chess column of the *Daily News Advertiser*. This newspaper was a major Vancouver daily which ceased publication in 1917; the chess column ran for just over two years, from February 1913 to March 1915. The very first column contained the following letter:

"Mr. B.A. Yates of South Vancouver has written to the chess editor, asking him to use his influence with a view to forming a chess club in this city. Mr. Yates wonders why it is a town of this size should be without a chess club. The chess editor will be glad to receive any communications on the subject." [Daily News Advertiser, 2 February 1913]

The identity of the chess editor is never revealed, but there is some evidence to suggest it was Yates himself. He was certainly an important figure in Vancouver chess circles at the time, and more on his life can be found in Bulletin #43. A chess club duly came into being, as described in subsequent columns:

"If I remember correctly, there was a similar movement started about three years ago. Mr. Brydon-Jack was, I believe, elected president, a meeting was held in the basement of the Carnegie Library, but somehow the matter fell through." [T.J. Corley, *Daily News Advertiser*, 16 February 1913]

"I was present at a meeting held in the Carnegie Library basement in December, 1910, probably the one referred to in your column. A committee was chosen to search for a suitable playing room and report, but as far as I am aware no other steps have been taken and presumably the committee is still searching." [Alfred Evans in *Daily News Advertiser*, 2 March 1913]

"By the kind permission of the National Loan & Investment Company a meeting was held in one of their offices last Wednesday to discuss the formation of a chess club. It was resolved to hold a further meeting in the smoke room of the Cabin Cafe next Tuesday, 18th inst., at 8 o'clock, principally to discuss the future home of the club. The organizers hope that all those interested will kindly attend." [Daily News Advertiser, 16 March 1913]

"The meeting that took place in the Cabin Cafe to form a chess club met with a very satisfactory response, between thirty and forty members being enrolled, and no doubt there will be many others who will join when it is better known. Anyone wishing to become a member kindly send his name to the secretary.

The following rules were drawn up: Vancouver Chess Club, season 1913-1914--President, B.A. Yates; vice-president, A. Stevenson; honorary secretary and treasurer, A. La C. Evans; committee, T.E. Pouris, A.Fraser.

- 1. The club shall be called the Vancouver Chess Club.
- 2. The annual subscription shall be one dollar. Entrance fee, one dollar.
- 3. The subscription and entrance fee to be paid in advance.
- 4. The officers of the club shall consist of president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and a committee by whom all the business of the club shall be managed. Any four to form a quorum, the president having the casting vote.
- 5. All members to be subject to equally divided further charges should the money in hand be found insufficient to meet requirements of the club.
- 6. The club to meet at the Cabin Cafe.
- 7. The chess room is open every day until 9 o'clock. Club night, Tuesday and Friday, at 8:30 until 12.
- 8. In the event of tournaments and matches being arranged the usual laws observed in all chess clubs to govern such games.
- 9. Notices of general interest to be posted in the club room by secretary.
- 10. These rules to be permanently hung in the club room." [Daily News Advertiser, 30 March 1913]

"The club has started a tournament to get some idea of the relative strength of its members. It is to be hoped that players will make an effort to get through their games as soon as possible. Players to play two games with each opponent." [Daily News Advertiser, 20 April 1913]

"The tournament, to give some idea of the relative strength of the players will, to all intents, be practically finished in about another fortnight, at which time this column will be discontinued for the summer months. The winner is sure to arise from the following: B.A. Yates (best average at present), R.C. Dickson, P. Fraser, Marchant." [Daily News Advertiser, 15 June 1913]

The club flourished, and indeed was the predominant Vancouver chess club until the formation of the City Chess Club in 1946. Various sources from the 1950s mention the VCC as being founded in 1911; this seems to be inaccurate, unless there really was a club meeting regularly at the Carnegie Library pre-1913 which has not come to light. Coincidentally, the Diamond Jubilee Tournament in 1973 was held to commemorate the sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the BCCF, but contemporary accounts place that event in 1916; perhaps confusion between 1913 and 1916 developed in the minds of the participants in later years.
